Arelis Moore de Peralta (MD, MEd, MPH, Dominican Republic; PhD, Clemson University) is a medical epidemiologist and social scientist with experience in health disparities research in the United States (US) and Latin America. She is a Tenure Track assistant professor of community health, with an interdisciplinary joint appointment at the Departments of Languages, Clemson University (CU). She is primarily interested in understanding the role of social determinants in the health disparities and inequities experienced by minority populations and people of color in the US and Latin America. Her current research focuses on using Communitybased Participatory Research (CBPR) to address health disparities and to promote partnerships to build healthier communities. As part of her community engagement and research at CU, she served as the director of the Center for Community Services (CCS), an activity of CU/IFNL located in Simpsonville, SC, and its Hispanic family outreach and support program "Café Cultura". Spanning nearly 25 years, her public health work has focused on developing systems and policies to promote health equity, and helping low-resource communities to develop partnerships, systems changes, and advocacy to improve their own health and well-being. As a community leader and advocate, she has assisted local and national advocacy groups and grassroots multicultural coalitions in developing and implementing initiatives and projects to reduce health disparities and to promote health equity. Dr. Moore has received numerous community engagement awards. In 2009, she received the Vera Paster Award from the American Orthopsychiatric Association for her work with Latino immigrants. She also received a Graduate Student Advising and Mentoring Award in 2015, and Bradley Mentoring Award on Creative Inquiry in 2018, at CU. Dr. Moore formerly was a faculty member in the School of Medicine at the Ibero-American University (UNIBE) in Santo Domingo. She coordinated disease preventative and control programs in the Ministry of Public Health in the Dominican Republic. She was also a national and international epidemiology consultant for international cooperation agencies including the Panamerican Health Organization (PAHO), UNICEF, USAID, and the CDC. Dr. Moore is a member of the Global Alliance Board of Directors.
